Background/Introduction

Africa's development is closely related to a thriving animal resources sector considering that most of it is arid and therefore more suited to livestock based agriculture than crop production. The backbone of the livelihoods of many communities in Africa is driven from animal resource namely livestock, fisheries, bees and wildlife. The performance of livestock production is linked to an effective veterinary service delivery system. The veterinary profession plays a critical role in promoting animal health and production, animal welfare, public health and the protection of the environment. Therefore, all cadres of the veterinary profession must adhere to high ethical standards and be prepared to apply their specialized knowledge and skills in the interest of others. This is regulated by the in country National Veterinary Statutory Body. The organization, structure and functioning of the Veterinary Statutory Bodies and Veterinary Associations are prerequisites not only for the quality of Veterinary Services but also for private veterinary practice in a country. Both organizations provide the necessary infrastructure to ensure that veterinarians in the public and the private sectors have the necessary qualifications, scientific expertise and experience and are free from any financial, commercial, hierarchical, political and other pressures which might affect their competence to make sound professional judgments based on existing scientific data. It is essential that all veterinarians and veterinary para-professionals are licensed to practice by an autonomous Veterinary Statutory Body and subject to legal disciplinary provisions for any professional misconduct. The existing structures and functional arrangements in most Member Countries of the African Union (AU) are not up to standards. Change is therefore necessary for compliance with the provisions of the Terrestrial Animal Health Code dealing with the quality of Veterinary Services, the issue of international veterinary certificates and the regulation of the practice of veterinarians and veterinary para-professionals in the public and the private sector. The OIE has developed standards and guidelines that aim to uphold veterinary standards for a safe and reliable product of animal origin. These standards are envisaged to be enforced by a country's Veterinary Statutory Body [VSB].

However, studies by the AU-IBAR show that there is widespread, poor or absence of regulation of the Veterinary Profession in some Member States of the African Union, failure to comply with international Guidelines on standards, and hefty medical and veterinary bills for Africa, as well as lock out of the African products of animal origin from the global market. The studies also showed disparity in the training, categorization and regulation of the Practitioners and the Profession.

The challenges of VSBs in Africa include inadequate or lack of legal recognition and weak legal structures in the states where they exist, scarcity of resources for operations, lack of, or insufficient

autonomy, insufficient technical capacity and insufficient resources to develop the technical capacity of the VSBs and their employees. The on-going intervention initiatives include the OIE PVS and Gap analysis, OIE Twinning Programs at the global level, the creation of the 2AVSB at the continental level, the creation of regional Associations of VSBs and signing of Mutual Recognition Agreements (MRAs) at the regional level and the enactment of legislation where they do not exist, review where they are weak, registration, licensing and accreditation, inspection of facilities, and taking disciplinary measures against culprits at the national level.

Towards the realization of the on-going initiative to establish and operationalize the 2AVSB, a road map for the 2AVSB Task Team was developed during the February 2018 AU-IBAR Conference in Dakar Senegal. The Task Team was tasked to identify key issues that need to be discussed in Cairo conference, to develop proposed documents on the functions, organizational structure, draft Legal Instrument for 2AVSB, and seek consensus from Member States to agree on the establishment of operationalization of the 2AVSB.

The Conference was therefore organized as a constituent general assembly (GA) for the establishment and launch of the 2AVSB, from 25-27 July 2018 at Safir Hotel in Cairo, Egypt.

Objective of the conference

The overall objective of the Pan African Conference was to establish and to launch the Association of African VSBs in order to enhance the effectiveness and efficiency of the VSBs and to ensure the quality of veterinary service delivery in Africa.

The Specific Objectives of the Conference were the following:

- To establish the Association African of VSB
- To launch the 2AVSB
- To promote networking among VSBs and the harmonization of Veterinary Service Delivery in AU Member States.
- To finalize a full project proposal for VSBs and twining program according to OIE guidelines
- To agree on the way forward

Expected Outputs and Outcomes from the Conference

- The establishment and the launch of VSB's Association in Africa
- An enhanced collaboration among all African VSBs, and the relevant stakeholders, especially the 2AV2E, APAW and Association of African Veterinary Associations [2AVA]
- The finalization of a detailed 5 Year-project proposal for funding

Roadmap/Action plan developed and agreed

Participants

A total of 55 participants attended the conference. The participants were the representatives of Veterinary Statutory Bodies (VSBs) and the Veterinary Associations (VA) from 43 African Union (AU) Member States (MS), namely Algeria, Angola, Benin, Botswana, Burkina Faso, Burundi, Cameroon, Cape Verde, Central African Republic, Chad, Congo Brazzaville, Cote d'Ivoire, Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), Egypt, Ethiopia, Gabon, Gambia, Ghana, Guinea, Guinea Bissau, Kenya, Lesotho, Libya, Madagascar, Malawi, Mali, Mauritania, Mauritius, Morocco, Mozambique, Namibia, Niger, Nigeria, Rwanda, Senegal, South Africa, South Sudan, Sudan, Swaziland, Togo, Tunisia, Uganda, and Zambia. Representative of African Veterinary Association (AVA), Regional Economic Communities (REC) namely COMESA, IGAD and UMA; Representatives of FAO, World Animal Protection, an Expert on Animal Identification and Traceability (LITS), a resource person, and IBAR staff also attended the conference (Appendix 7).

Opening Session

The opening ceremony for the Conference took place on 26th July 2018 presided over by the hosting country's officials. It began with the introductory remarks by Dr. Baboucarr Jaw, Chief Animal Health Officer of AU-IBAR, who then read the opening remarks on behalf of Prof Ahmed Elsawalhy, the Director of AU-IBAR. This was followed by the introduction of the different Associations and Networks.

In the official ceremony, Dr. Baboucarr Jaw presented the newly elected Board Chairpersons and members, who he invited to make brief descriptions of the Associations and Networks. He then invited the Director of AU-IBAR Prof. Ahmed Elsawalhy to preside over the ceremony. The Director, on behalf of the Commissioner of the Department of Agriculture and Rural Economy (DREA), Her Excellency Josefa Sacko Corriea, welcomed participants to the closing ceremony and thanked the Government and the People of the Arab Republic of Egypt for hosting this historical event. Notably, the Commissioner stated that "the Networks and the Associations being supported by AU-IBAR will facilitate information and experiences sharing across countries and institutions. They will also enhance collaboration thus building capacity of the institutions and individuals concerned. The Associations and Networks will leverage efforts and form a basis for efficient use of the available scarce resources by avoiding duplication of efforts. They will also play a key role on advocacy for animal resources issues and create a critical mass to not only influence policy but also promote policy implementation". He concluded that "African Union Commission through his department will continue working and supporting the Networks and the Associations as means for efficient

and effective transformation of the animal resources sector in Africa".

The Director then invited the Minister of Agriculture and Land Reclamation, H.E. Prof Dr. Ezz El Din Abostate, of the Arab Republic of Egypt to make his remarks. The Minister expressed appreciation to African Union Commission for having chosen the Arab Republic of Egypt as hosting country of this important conference. He said that "In Egypt, we place very high value on the livestock sector because it provides an important means of addressing the food security and job demands of the Egyptian community. In recognition of the role of the livestock sector, the National Sustainable Development Strategy 2030 places a strong focus on investment in the livestock sector. From the aforementioned, women and youths are considered the back bone of livestock value chains not only in Egypt but also in other African countries, recognizing that the creation of more gainful and productive women and youth employment in the livestock sector is an important means to reduce rural poverty. On the other hand, he also welcomed the key role that the Veterinary Educational Establishments and the Veterinary Statutory Bodies will play in shaping the youth and ensuing quality and harmonization of our endeavours in line with International standards."

Proceedings of the Conference

The conference was conducted over three (3) days. The meeting was organized through sessions of power point presentations, working group and plenary discussions on various topics highlighted in the agenda. The presentations and discussions enabled the participants, through group work and plenary sessions, to address the various topics highlighted in the agenda. Thus, the participants were able to contribute and consolidate their inputs, which resulted in their adoption of the constitution, the voting procedures, the election of both regional and continental board of the 2AVSB, the development of a comprehensive work plan on the post-conference follow-up actions and the formulation of the resolutions / recommendations out of the conference. Among other key outputs from the conference, was the opportunity for the participants to receive expert sensitization on the critical role of effective veterinary regulation in mainstreaming Animal Welfare in national and regional legislation, strategies and policies. This is because it is clearly evident that the performance of animals is as good as the welfare they receive. The need to mainstream One-Health in National and Regional legislation, strategies and policies was highlighted, as well as technology and Innovation, especially for data management with regard to the status of veterinary services including veterinary practitioners, training and animal traceability. The role of networking with relevant stakeholders was highlighted through a presentation by the African Veterinary Association. The detailed agenda is presented in Appendix 5. Summary of the Presentations

Session I - Status of Veterinary Statutory Bodies in Africa

The objectives and expected outputs of the conference. These objectives were given to be to establish the Association of African VSB, to launch the 2AVSB, to finalize the project proposal for 2AVSBs, and to agree on the post-conference road map and the follow up actions (work plan). The expected outputs from the conference included the finalization and adoption of the constitution of the 2AVSB, the election of the Executive Committee at the General Assembly of the 2AVSB, and the launch of the 2AVSB. A presentation from AU-IBAR highlighted its interventions in supporting coherence and alignment of animal resources development efforts in Africa. The presentation on "the importance/role of VSB in promoting animal, public and environmental health in Africa" emphasized that the 2AVSB would enhance the VSBs at the Member State level to discharge their mandate through strategic approaches to tackle the challenges that exist. The presentation on the status of VSBs in Africa clearly indicated that Africa's ambitions to realize animal resources sector would be futile with the current weak status of veterinary regulation in Africa. It was highlighted that the 2AVSB would provide a suitable platform to tackle the incumbent challenges and constraints throughout the continent. The presentation on African Veterinary Association (AVA) highlighted the importance of ensuring the inclusion of the veterinarians in the intervention strategies, since the VSBs were basically established to regulate the competence and ethical practice of veterinarians and the para-veterinarians.

Session 2 - Constitution/Statues of the VSB Association

The role of the proposed Association of African Veterinary Statutory Bodies was shown to be to give strategic direction and guidance for effective and efficient VSBs across Africa. An overview of the proposed constitution of the 2AVSB was presented, with an emphasis that it was meant to be provide the basic laws or principles that describe the rights and duties of 2AVSB members and the way in which it will be governed. During the group and plenary discussions, the proposed constitution and the governance structures were reviewed, and consolidated. It was then adopted. The voting modalities for the election of the leadership of the 2AVSB was done, and the guidelines accepted and adopted.

Session 3 - Election of 2AVSB Board/Executive Committee

Elections for the Executive Committee Members were held, and the committee installed.

Session 4 - VSB Program Proposal

The proposed 2AVSB Program Proposal was presented, with its purpose, goals, objectives and key investment areas articulated. The key investment areas were given as the development and management of a database repository for VSBs in AU MS, the enhancement of effectiveness of VSBs to ensure quality of veterinary service delivery, the promotion of collaboration among African VSBs and to support harmonization of VSB structures and activities. Through a review and discussion of the proposal in group work, it was consolidated, finalized and adopted by the General Assembly.

Session 5 - VSB proving leadership in addressing emerging and societal concerns

AU-IBAR's presentation highlighted that animal welfare issues were gaining increasing importance worldwide, including countries in Africa. Compliance with international animal welfare standards were becoming a requisite in trade agreements. Additionally, animal welfare principles are recognized to be key determinants of animal resource development; incomes and livelihoods related to animals are yet to receive adequate attention. It was therefore imperative to mainstreaming animal welfare in national and regional legislation, strategies and policies. Likewise, AU-IBAR emphasized that considering that veterinary public health cuts across animal, human and environmental health, the mainstreaming of One Health in national and regional legislation, strategies and policies was inevitable. In presentation of "Technology and Innovation in Africa; the Rusty Cog", AU-IBAR emphasized that the impetus of Africa's development balances delicately on her ability, willingness and capacity to adopt technology, for evaluation of the quality of regulation and its impacts, global trends in quality standards and guidelines as well as gaps in regulation and the intervention opportunities. The World Animal Protection, in its presentation on "Animal in Disaster: Integrating Disaster Risk Reduction",

emphasized that with climate change and other challenges incumbent upon Africa, the need for animal-centric disaster preparedness was inevitable considering the important role that animals play in the livelihood of majority of the African Community. Animal-centric disaster preparedness is critical to the resilience of the affected communities, considering that their livelihoods are centered around animals, and therefore this should be the mainstreamed in national and regional legislation, strategies and policies. A presentation by an expert on "Animal Identification and Traceability" highlighted that traceability in today's environment which demands evidence of quality measures from production to consumption was inevitable, if Africa is to remain relevant, and therefore this should be the mainstreamed in national and regional legislation, strategies and policies.

Session 6 - Post Cairo Road map and Closing ceremony

It was emphasized that the Post-Cairo Roadmap for the 2AVSB depended largely on partnerships and collaboration arrangements. The sustainability of the program will rely on a seed capital from African Union Commission [AUC]; subscription from memberships, support from development partners, M&E for Information and Knowledge management, risk analysis of assumptions, governance and management structures as well as an efficient financing arrangement and cost estimates. In the closing remarks, the AU-IBAR pledged to continue supporting the new 2AVSB program through providing a Secretariat at the AU-IBAR, supported by a Team of Experts from the just ended Establishment and Operationalization Task Team, as well as other incubation resources as it develops capacity to stand on its own.

Outcomes of the conference

- Finalization and adoption of the constitution of the 2AVSB;
- Election of the Executive Committee of the 2AVSB
- Launch of the 2AVSB
- Pledge by the AU-IBAR to support the operationalization of the 2AVSB, including being the Secretariat of the 2AVSB during the formative stage
- · Development and adoption of the road map for post conference follow up actions

Resolutions and Recommendations

The conference yielded the following:

Resolutions

- 1. VSBs in the AU shall belong to the AU-recognized geographical regions they belong in
- 2. VSBs in a given geographical region shall establish a network referred to as the Geographical Region Association of VSBs [GRAVSBs];

- 3. All AU MS at the Cairo 2AVSB Launching Conference shall constitute the Inaugural AVSB
- 4. Inaugural 2AVSB MS which have Non-VSB organizations serving as VSBs shall have established a VSB within a maximum of 5 years for them to remain in the 2AVSB Register
- 5. There will be no registration fee charged
- 6. Members will pay an annual retention fee

Recommendations

- I. AU-IBAR will support MS to organize themselves in GRAVSBs
- 2. AU-IBAR will host/accommodate the secretariat of 2AVSB until its full operationalization
- 3. AU-IBAR will serve as the Secretariat of the 2AVSB until it [2AVSB] establishes its own Secretariat
- 4. AU-IBAR will constitute a Technical committee to support the operationalization process of the Inaugural Executive Committee
- 5. AU-IBAR will seek partnerships [EU, ADB, others] to support building the technical and infrastructural frameworks of the 2AVSB

What is 2AVSB

The Association of African Veterinary Statutory Bodies (2AVSB) is a collaborative continental platform to promote the quality of veterinary services in Africa for improved animal health and food safety.
